

- 1. EMPLOYMENT & EDUCATION. It is to your advantage to learn some skilled occupation and although at first the wages will probably not be so high as in some unskilled work, you will have a much better prospect of earning good wages later on. This applies whether you are in an office, a warehouse or a factory. When you have secured a job try to learn all you can about it and the work in which your firm is engaged. Make time to attend classes specially suitable for improving your technical knowledge and your general education. Particulars of suitable classes can be obtained from the Education Office and Juvenile Employment Bureau. Whatever happens, do not leave your employment before seeking advice at the Bureau.
- 2. UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE. You become insurable as soon as you start work. You must apply personally and produce your birth certificate and National Registration Identity Card at the Bureau so that an *Unemployment Book* can be issued to before your employment commences.
- 3. HEALTH INSURANCE. You must obtain a Health Insurance Card from an Approved Society or the Post Office.
- 4. SOCIAL LIFE. Presentation of this card at the Youth Centre at Noel Park School will entitle you to apply for membership. Indoor and outdoor games, music. dancing, drama, art etc., are included in the activities of the club. Particulars of other clubs, including physical training classes, are available at the Bureau. Membership of one of these will help you to make a suitable selection of friends.
- 5. SAVINGS. Start to save just as soon as you begin to earn money. The habit is a good one which you will never regret. One of the easiest ways of saving is by purchase of National Savings Stamps at the Post Office or by joining a Saving Society through which you can save a regular amount each week.
- THE JUVENILE EMPLOYMENT BUREAU. 9, Stuart Crescent, Wood Green, is open daily from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. (except Saturdays) and on Fridays until 7 p.m. The officers will be pleased to see you or hear from you at all times and will always be willing to help and advise you.

## REGULATIONS FOR CORPORAL PUNISHMENT IN SCHOOLS Approved by the Education Committee on 10th July, 1950

- 1. The Headmaster or Headmistress of the School is responsible to the Education Authority for all forms of punishment, including corporal punishment, which are used in the School.
- 2. Corporal punishment should never be severe and should be used only if it appears that other disciplinary measures are inappropriate and after due regard has been had to the emotional and psychological effects of the punishment on the individual child. In the case of persistent offenders, the desirability of reference to the Educational Psychologist or the Child Guidance Centre should be considered.
- Any forms of correction which would be likely to affect adversely the mental or physical development of the child, e.g., boxing the ears, striking on the head, rapping the knuckles, are strictly prohibited.
- 4. No corporal punishment should be inflicted except by the Headmaster or the Headmistress or by such Assistant Teachers as may be especially authorised by him or her.
- 5. Headmasters and Headmistresses who give to, or withdraw from, any Assistant Teachers the right to inflict corporal punishment should note the facts at the time in the school record (formerly referred to as the school log book).
- 6. Corporal punishment should normally be inflicted in private.
- 7. Corporal punishment should only be inflicted with a cane. In the case of boys it should be inflicted on the hand or buttocks. In the case of girls, corporal punishment should not be inflicted save in exceptional circumstances and then only by the Headmistress or an assistant mistress, and on the hands only.
- The cane should on each occasion be obtained from the Headmaster or Headmistress and returned to him/her after use.
- A record of every case of corporal punishment must be entered in the punishment book by the
  person inflicting it, and be initialled by the Headmaster or Headmistress immediately after
  the punishment is inflicted.
- 10. The Head Teacher must ensure that the punishment book is available for inspection at the request of, or on behalf of, the County Education Committee, the Divisional Executive, the Governors or Managers as appropriate.

### Infant Schools

While the general principles set out above should be applied in schools for children of all ages, Headmistresses of Infant Schools will doubtless concur in the view that corporal punishment in the case of infant pupils will rarely be necessary. Where, in the exceptional case, it appears to be the only remedy, the use of the open hand on forearm or thigh should be sufficient. An appropriate entry should be made in the punishment book.

On the 13th October 1940, an aircraft operating out of formation bombed the static buildings and surrounding houses. The blast collapsed the tunnel at the Cockfosters end the westbound platform, an area which had been allocated to sixty people.

Nineteen shelterers were killed and twenty seriously injured. Sixteen fatalities were Belgia refugees who were permanently allotted to the east end of the platform. The remainir three were British newcomers to the shelter who had been temporarily placed in the Belgia area by the station foreman. It was two months before trains were running again, but in macabre way this was appreciated by the surviving shelterers as they were guaranteed period of good sleep. The absence of tiles at the east end of the platform is a visual remind of this disaster.

## The Post - War Years...

ducation did not escape the sweeping post war changes in Britain. The 1944 Education Act transferred Bounds Green Schools from the Wood Green Education Committee to the jurisdiction of the County of Middlesex.

In the classroom a greater emphasis came to be placed on talks by outsiders (such as the police on safety first, and the Commonwealth Institute on life abroad), and on outings. For example, as part of the extensive celebrations in 1953, the Infant School children (and probably the others) went to the Gaumont Cinema in Wood Green to see "A Queen is Crowned". Of course, few of them would have had TV sets at home!

The Schools became crowded in the immediate post war "baby boom" years. Infant School roll in 1955 was 493, and a class had to be accommodated on the haplatform! ### **SPORT**

The Infants School has had a distinguished sporting history in the post war years. (Records for the Junior School have not been kept). It came first in the local inter-schools sports in at least 1947, 1948, 1949, 1950, 1965, 1966, 1967, 1968, 1971, 1972 and 1973. It achieved 2nd place in 1951, 1953,

1954, 1964 and 1970. The School won the local premier league championship in 196 (to match the World Cup!); and the interschools swimming gala at Western Road & (now shut).

### **NELL EDWARDS**

A former pupil of Bounds Green schools, visited the junior school in 1973 to celebr her 83rd birthday. Nell came to Bounds G Infant School in 1896. When she was six y old, she progressed to the Juniors. From t she won a scholarship to Tottenham Polytechnic. Nell donated three paintings which remain in the school, from her jour around the world. At the school Nell was delighted to find the building very little changed from the days when she had bee there. The present head boy of the school Rudy Adam, and head girl Alison Rice gav her a basket of flowers from fellow pupils, Sonay Mustapha who was celebrating her 11th birthday, presented a huge card. Lee Bishop had made the card and it was sign by everyone in the School.






Plans to improve the playgound, by creating a tumble area with a saftey surface and many other ideas like seats and shelterd areas, playground painting and murals are under way.
